Electronics Recycling

On January 1, 2012, the Illinois Electronic Products Recycling and Reuse Act landfill ban for certain electronic devices became effective. Electronic items such as televisions, monitors, computers and printers are some of the most common items that are no longer allowed in the regular trash.

On Wednesday, December 11th from 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. SWALCO will have a residential electronics recycling drop-off location at Gurnee Public Works (1151 Kilbourne Road, Gurnee, IL 60031) that will be free of charge for Gurnee residents. Proof of address is required.

When recycling at the residential electronics drop-off locations, there is a limit of seven items per visit (excluding miscellaneous cords and cables).

Protect Your Home from Cold Weather

As a friendly reminder from the Building Safety Division and Fire Department, winter can be extremely hard on your home. To help protect your property and keep your pipes from being damaged, take the following steps before temperatures sink below freezing:

- Find your main water shutoff so you can turn off the water to your home quickly in an emergency. Locations vary look in the crawlspace or basement. In case of broken pipes during the day, please contact our Public Works Department at (847) 599-6800 or the non-emergency dispatch number (847) 599-7000 to report the problem;
- Disconnect garden hoses from the exterior faucets to prevent water from freezing in the hose and rupturing the faucet. Drain your hoses and store them where they are protected from the weather to prolong their life-span;
- Insulate your outdoor faucets with foam faucet covers;
- Fix broken basement windows. Please remember that if you need to replace a window, a permit is required;
- Open cabinet doors under sinks to let warm air flow around your water supply lines (be careful of small children and keep chemicals out of reach while the doors are open);
- In case of severe cold weather, check the water flow periodically to make sure there is
 not a drop in pressure, which could be a sign of a frozen pipe. Leave the faucets open
 slightly to keep water flowing; and
- If you are leaving town do NOT turn off the heat to your home.

Seasonal Reminders

Adopt-a-Hydrant

The Fire Department is looking for volunteers for its "Adopt-A-Hydrant" program. Residents can "adopt" a fire hydrant near their home and ensure it is visible throughout the year in case of a fire. For more information, visit www.gurnee.il.us/adopt-a-hydrant/.

Holiday Waste Management Schedule

All solid waste and recycling collection will be delayed by one day following the Christmas and New Year's Day holidays. Holidays will be observed on December 25 and January 1, therefore there will be no solid waste or recycling collection on both Wednesday's. All collection will be delayed one day from customer's normal pickup day.

Christmas Tree Collection

Waste Management will collect Christmas trees on the following dates:

- Wednesday, January 8, 2020
- Wednesday, January 15, 2020
- Wednesday, January 22, 2020
- Wednesday, January 29, 2020

In order for a tree to be collected, it must be placed at the curb or the edge of the street by 7:00 a.m. on the pick-up day. All lights and decorations must be removed. Failure to remove decorations or placing the tree in a plastic bag will result in the tree not being collected that week and, consequently, the resident will have to wait until the following week. Trees placed out after January 29, 2020 will not be collected.

Drunk Driving Awareness

To ensure that everyone has a safe holiday season, the Gurnee Police Department will be increasing enforcement during December's "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" campaign. Ensure holiday guests have a safe ride home.

Plowing Reminders

Keeping the Village's roads and sidewalks safe and clear of snow and ice is a major job. While the Public Works Department does most of the work, a little help from everyone can make a major difference. Below are some friendly reminders on what to do (and not do) during a snowstorm:

Clear Your Sidewalk

One of the biggest obstacles after a winter are impassable sidewalks. While the Village does not require shoveling within a certain time frame, all residents should recognize that shoveling is an important part of keeping sidewalks safe for the public and that the Village strongly encourages residents to clear their sidewalks within 24 hours of a snowfall.

Place Shoveled Snow On Your Yard

The Village's plowing system is designed to handle most snow and ice events with relative ease. However, one variable that even the best system cannot control is when snow is thrown back in the street. This works against plowing and can lead to hazardous, icy conditions for drivers and pedestrians. Please place snow from your driveway and sidewalk on your lawn or parkway instead of in the street. Failure to do so may result in warnings or fines. Residents wishing to report thrown snow can report it to the Code Enforcement Division at (847) 599-7550.

Park Vehicles Off Village Streets

Under Village Code, it is illegal to park a vehicle on a Village street within 12 hours of a two-inch or more snowfall OR until snow has been removed from Village streets. This is done to ensure that plowing can be completed as quickly and efficiently as possible and to minimize unnecessary damage to property. Any vehicle found to be in violation of this ordinance may be ticketed or towed at the owner's expense.

Understanding the Village's Snow & Ice Control Program

Each year, long before snow and ice begin falling, the Public Works Department is diligently preparing for the snow season. Winter storms impact all Village residents, businesses, institutions and the motoring public, and the safety and well-being of the general public is highly dependent on the work of the Department before, during and after each storm event. Understanding how plowing works can be a great help in navigating winter weather. This article is intended to give the public a snapshot of the work that goes into managing roads during each winter event.

Planning for a storm event can begin several days in advance of the first snowflakes falling. Since each event is unique, the Department modifies its strategy depending on variables such as the type of snow (sleet, wet snow or fluffy flakes), temperature (rising or falling as well as air temperature versus surface temperature), time of day (day, night, weekend and/or rush hour), event duration and post-storm weather predictions. The general goal, however, remains the same for each event during the winter.

During an event, the Department will clear the Village's roads using a pre-defined route plan. Each route divides the local streets into three categories: collector streets (first priority roads such as Almond, Dada, Lawson, Southridge, Manchester and Belle Plaine), local streets (second priority) and cul-de-sacs and dead-ends (third priority). Typically, depending on the event, a full run of each route takes between four to six hours. In heavy snowstorms, however, crews will make two passes down each street and a single pass into cul-de-sacs to make streets and cul-de-sacs accessible. Final clean-up operations, such as cleaning from curb to curb, are normally completed after storms begin to diminish.

It is important to understand that the Village manages only Village-owned streets as part of the snow plan. Plowing of major roads such as Grand Avenue (Rt. 132), US 41, Route 21 and IL Route 120 are managed by the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) and roads such as Washington St., Delany Rd., O'Plaine Rd. and Hunt Club Rd. are managed by the Lake County Division of Transportation (LCDOT).

During and after a snow event, the Department's goal is to keep roads open and passable to the

greatest extent possible. This means that while motorists will be able to travel on roads, these roads may not be completely clear of snow or ice, especially in extremely cold conditions. Again, the Department manages its resources wisely and encourages all drivers to build in extra travel time and drive safely and slowly when the snow starts to fly.

Frequently Asked Questions

Where can 1 recycle needles?

As part of the residential refuse and recycling contract, the Village has partnered with Waste Management to provide a community MedWaste kiosk at Village Hall. Residents who use sharps, syringes or lancets to inject medications can use this kiosk to dispose of this medical waste. Medical waste is disposed of separately from other refuse in order to prevent it from ending up in the environment, where it can pose a risk of injury or infection to others.

What do I do if I see a streetlight outage?

The Village has a network of more than 2,100 streetlights throughout the community to keep residential neighborhoods and businesses safe and illuminated. The Public Works Department is responsible for the maintenance of 1,675 of these streetlights and the remaining 425 streetlights are owned and maintained by Commonwealth Edison (Com Ed). If you know of a streetlight outage, please contact us at (847) 599-6800 so that we can schedule the repair or notify Com Ed. We will attempt to respond to outages within 72 hours of the initial call.

How can I pay my water bill?

Residential customers may pay their water bills online using a Visa, MasterCard, American Express, Discover credit card or debit card, through enrollment of the Automatic Bank Debit program, by mail, via the Night Deposit Box at the Village Hall and in person at the Village Hall.

What do I do if my mailbox is damaged?

If your mailbox was damaged by the Village snow plow during plowing operations, please call Public Works at (847) 599-6800 to report the damage.

Will a red light violation show up on my record?

No, a red light violation will not show up on your driving record. However, a person who has accumulated five or more unpaid citations can have their drivers licensed suspended by the Illinois Secretary of State.

Village Updates

Recreational Cannabis Sales Ban

On Monday, November 18th, the Village Board approved an
ordinance banning the sale of recreational cannabis in Gurnee.
Under the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, private recreational
cannabis use will be legal for adults 21 and over. Communities
were provided the option to opt-in or opt-out. Gurnee joined
nearby communities including Libertyville, Grayslake, Lake Bluff,
and Lake Forest, to name a few, that have opted out of sales.

Ethylene Oxide

 The Village of Gurnee, the Lake County Health Department and the City of Waukegan are currently undergoing ninety days of ambient air monitoring around Vantage Specialty Chemical (3938 Porett Drive) and Medline in Waukegan to monitor levels of ethylene oxide in the air. This data will be sent to the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry (ATSDR) for a health risk assessment of the community. To follow updates on ethylene oxide, visit www.gurnee.il.us/eto.

Vaping Moratorium

 On Monday, November 18th, the Village Board approved a moratorium on allowing additional vaping and e-cigarette stores from opening in Gurnee. This moratorium will not impact businesses currently in operation, but will prevent future stores and kiosks from operating in Gurnee.
